Pray for the Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit

Wisdom: We see God at work in our lives and in the world. We see God as our Father, appreciate the dignity of others, and find God in all things.

Understanding: We comprehend how we need to live as followers of Christ. A person with understanding is not confused by the conflicting messages in our culture about the right way to live. This gift perfects our speculative reason in the apprehension of truth. It is the gift whereby self-evident principles are known.

Counsel (Right Judgement): We know the difference between right and wrong, and we choose to do what is right. With this gift we avoid sin and live out the values taught by Jesus.

Fortitude (Courage): We overcome our fear and are willing to take risks as followers of Christ. With this gift we are willing to stand up for what is right in the sight of God, even if it means accepting rejection, verbal abuse and physical harm. This gift allows us the firmness of mind that is required both in doing good and in enduring evil.

Knowledge: We understand the meaning of God. This gift is more than an accumulation of facts.

Piety (Reverence): We have a deep sense of respect for God and the Church. This gift allows us to recognise our total reliance on God and come before Him with humility, trust, and love. At the Holy Spirit's instigation, we pay worship and duty to God as our Father.

Fear of the Lord (Wonder and Awe): We are aware of the glory and majesty of God. We know that God is the perfection of all we desire: perfect knowledge, goodness, power, and love. It is the fear of separating oneself from God. A filial fear, like a child's fear of offending his father, rather than a servile fear, that is, a fear of punishment. This gift is the beginning of wisdom as it puts our mindset in correct location with respect of God: we are the finite, dependent creatures, and He is the infinite, all-powerful Creator.

Divine love is sacrificial love. Love does not mean to have and to own and to possess. It means to be had and to be owned and to be possessed. It is not a circle circumscribed by self; it is arms outstretched to embrace all humanity within its grasp. No other love is ever going to be a satisfying love. All that we ever get in this world anyway is just a fragment, a fraction of love. We can catch a spark; it is caught up from the great white flame of love which is God. That's all we ever get. And if, to remind us of another love, the spark is so bright, then what must be the flame? It's the cross; it's self-denial, it's victimhood, for this is the gospel of Christ, and we cannot soften Him. He is the One Who gave His life, and that's the way He measures His love. Greater love than this no man has. When we stay close to that love, day after day, hour after hour, others will begin to feel that love.

It is true that in every single system of authoritarianism fear is the basis of obedience. But because we start with the Person of Christ, the basis of our obedience is not fear, it is love. You cannot love dialectical materialism, but you can love a person.

Between our Lord and us there is the bond of love. These two are inseparable. That is why our Lord did not communicate to Peter the power of ruling and governing His Church until Peter told our Lord three times that he loved Him. The power to command in the Church comes only from obedience to Christ. Therefore, the submission that we as Catholics make to the Church is something like the submission that we make to one of our most devoted friends. It is like the obedience of a son to a loving father.

We do not feel any distance between our Lord and us. As a pupil becomes more and more attached to his teacher by absorbing more of the truths of the teacher, so too, the more we become more and more united to Christ, the more we love Him and also the more truth we absorb. The more we know our Lord, the more we obey the truth manifested through His Church, and the less we fear. That is why scripture says, 'Perfect love casts out fear.' The more His truth abounds, the more we love Him.

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church

III. The Gifts and Fruits of the Holy Spirit

1830. The moral life of Christians is sustained by the gifts of the Holy Spirit. These are permanent dispositions which make the human person docile in following the promptings of the Holy Spirit.

1831. The seven gifts of the Holy Spirit are wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord. They belong in their fullness to Christ, Son of David. They complete and perfect the virtues of those who receive them. They make the faithful docile in readily obeying divine inspirations.

1832. The fruits of the Spirit are perfections that the Holy Spirit forms in us as the first fruits of eternal glory. the tradition of the Church lists twelve of them: "charity, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, generosity, gentleness,

faithfulness, modesty, self-control, chastity."

protection and guidance, so that I may persevere in doing good and in fleeing evil until my last breath. Amen. **National Centre for Pastoral Research:** The Catholic bishops of Australia have given to the NCPR the task of collecting and analysing data that assists with future planning and understanding current needs. The NCPR has recently released the results of their analysis of the 2021 Australian Census. The following figures show that we have reached a

critical moment regarding the key indicator of the strength of the Catholic faith in our country, namely, the number of Catholics who attend Holy Mass on any given Sunday of the year.

In 2021, there were 417,000 Catholics who attended Sunday Mass. This is a decline of 206,000 from the 2016 Census. This is a 33% drop. In 2021, 5,075,800 Australians declared themselves as Catholic on the census form. Therefore, in 2021 8.2% of Catholics attended Mass. This was a decline from 11.8% in 2016, but this was 11.8% of a larger number who declared themselves as Catholics in that census. The Mass attendance as a percentage of the Australian population is: 2011 - 3.1%, 2016 - 2.7%, 2021 - 1.6%.
