#### Hearing Loop (from Fr Paul)

It came to my attention in September last year that the Hearing Loop in the church was not working. At first, I thought it may have been damaged during the installation of the air conditioning in August but upon consultation with the installers that proved not to be the case. Then began a rather long process of finding someone who was willing and able to investigate the issue for us.

It proved impossible to find someone locally who had the expertise and the interest in helping us so I had to go further afield. Two companies in Tamworth were approached and, after a few false starts, Peter Scott from Tamworth Audio made a visit two weeks ago. All of this has taken 6 months to accomplish.

Apparently, the loop is under the carpet but is not intact and so there is no signal. The break in the loop may have been caused by rodents or the fragility of the copper wire as it has aged. To replace this under-carpet loop would require the carpet to be taken up and a new loop laid, followed by new carpet.

We cannot envisage replacing the carpet at the moment until the leaks in the "spire" above the altar and the water access in the foyer can be fixed. Otherwise it would be a waste of money since there would continue to be water damage on new carpet.

The other option is to install a replacement hearing assistance system. It would be wall mounted and contain an IR emitter unit with two transmitters and a rack mounted encoder in the AV cabinet. It involves running two Cat6 cables to two locations mounted high on the sanctuary wall. Being a new system, at extra cost, it could cater for those who have hearing aids, and those who don't, as well those who use cochlear implants.

The cost of the full kit is \$13,749.00 plus fitting and commissioning.

At the moment, we can't afford this as it would empty

our Parish account and we would need to take some funds from our investment accounts.

So, I pose the questions:

- Do we need a hearing assistance system?
- If so, how can we afford it?
- ◆ Do we delay until we raise the funds?

I would be interested to hear your responses or you may also speak to the members of the Finance Committee: Dudley McLennan, David McMahon, Rodney Moffitt and Peter Turner. This issue will be considered at the next meeting on 10th April.

# A reflection by the Venerable Servant of God, Archbishop Fulton J Sheen

By defending the woman, Christ proved Himself a friend of sinners, but only of those who admitted that they were sinners. He had to go to the social outcasts to find bigness of heart and unmeasured generosity which, according to Him, constituted the very essence of love. Though they were sinners, their love lifted them above the self-wise and the selfsufficient, who never bent their knees in prayer for pardon. He came to put a harlot above a Pharisee, a penitent robber above a High Priest, and a prodigal son above his exemplary brother. To all the phonies and fakers who would say that they could not join the Church because His Church was not holy enough, He would ask, 'How holy must the Church be before you will enter into it?' If the Church were as holy as they wanted it to be, they would never be allowed into it! In every other religion under the sun, in every Eastern religion from Buddhism to Confucianism, there must always be some purification before one can commune with God. But Our Blessed Lord brought a religion where the admission of sin is the condition of coming to Him. 'Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are ill.'

But why would He not condemn her? Because He would be condemned for her. Innocence would not condemn, because Innocence would suffer for the guilty. Justice would be saved, for He would pay the debt of her sins; mercy would be saved, for the merits of His death would apply to her soul. Justice is first, then mercy; first the satisfaction, then the pardon. Our Lord really was the only One in that crowd who had the right to take up the stone to execute judgment against her, because He was without sin. On the other hand, He did not make light of sin, for He assumed its burden. Forgiveness cost something and the full price would be paid on the hill of the three Crosses where justice would be satisfied and mercy extended. It was this release from the slavery of sin that He called the beautiful name of freedom.

# A New Saint for the Church



On Sunday, April 27th, a new saint will be added to the very long list of saints. He is Carlo Acutis, whose first class relic and exhibition of Eucharistic Miracles visited our parish last year.

Carlo Acutis was born and baptised in London in 1991 but moved to Milan shortly after. As a little boy, especially after his First Communion, Carlo never missed his daily appointment with the Holy Mass and the Rosary, followed by a moment of Eucharistic adoration.

During his early teenage years, Carlo developed remarkable computer skills, and between 2004 and 2006 created a website which catalogued each reported Eucharistic miracle in the world, in addition to a list of Marian apparitions, to introduce Jesus to a younger generation on their desktops. This exhibition, which involved the help of his entire family, was unveiled just over a week before his death. He was diagnosed with leukaemia and died four days later at the age of 15 on 12th October 2006, offering his suffering for Pope Benedict XVI and the Church.

The story of his short life is available in a book called "A Milennial in Paradise" and is available from a Catholic bookstore in Melbourne that delivers quickly and for a flat rate: veritatis.com.au

Soon we can say, "St Carlo Acutis, pray for us." He has visited our parish so we have a claim on his protection and intercession.
